# Statements & Search Criteria

## **Mission**

Richmond Friends of the Homeless was founded to strengthen and enrich the lives of the disadvantaged and homeless in our community.

Our mission is served by providing a nutritious lunch seven days a week in Richmond's most impoverished neighborhoods: Blackwell/Bainbridge/Hillside and Jackson Ward/Gilpin Court/Mosby Court are encompassed. This includes a hearty bagged lunch on Saturdays and Sundays in south Richmond. Breakfast and a Book is available for the children we see each day. Our goal is the alleviation of hunger in our community, as well as providing numerous much needed services to those living in poverty. This includes blankets, clothing, warm winter items, personal hygiene kits, and food baskets. Counseling, referral services, and regularly scheduled "health fairs" are offered. Special children's services include making available school supplies, book bags, funds for field trips, gym suits and graduation clothing as needed. We provide all of our services with the time and talents of a tremendous volunteer base which includes schools, churches and congregations of all denominations, civic groups, businesses and individuals who want to make a difference in their community.

## **Background**

Richmond Friends of the Homeless was begun in 1986 after our founder witnessed a young child eating from a trash can off Jefferson Davis Hwy. Our first program site was opened in south Richmond and provided a nutritious hot lunch every Monday through Friday. In 2002, we opened our second site in Jackson Ward/Gilpin Court where lunch is provided Monday through Friday. In 2008, we opened a third site to provide a Saturday and Sunday meal in south Richmond. Breakfast and a Book began in 2009, providing a child friendly breakfast and age appropriate book for each child who comes in to lunch....so they will have something to take home with them for the next morning. We have earned the trust and respect of those we serve and of the greater Richmond community. We continue to partner with over 103 local churches, synagogues, businesses, civic groups and schools who are a vital part of our efforts. We are proud to provide an environment where people who want to make a difference in their community can come and directly impact the lives of those less fortunate around us.

## **Impact**

In 2016 we:

- Provided 3,300 meals each week to those who were hungry in our community.
- Distributed record numbers of blankets, clothing and personal hygiene items.
- Alleviated hunger and improved the nutritional status of homeless veterans, seniors barely existing on Social Security, those who have lost their jobs, children with inadequate food at home, people battling addictions - hungry men, women and children of all ages in need of a nourishing meal.
- Distributed 85,000 pounds of food through our food baskets to families in crisis.

Goals for 2015 include:

- The continuation of meals through three program sites seven days a week.
- Having blankets, clothing and personal hygiene items available as needed.
- Continuing to respond to the needs of the children we see through our Breakfast and a Book and Children's Services programs.
- Distribute 86,000 pounds of food through food baskets.

## **Needs**

Financial concerns are always our #1 pressing need. This is a special challenge in difficult economic climates. All other needs stem from this.
